Dr. Chan called the meeting to order at 3:01 p.m.

## **COMMUNICATIONS: BOARD / SUPERINTENDENT**

Ms. Jimena said she had a great time at the CSBA Annual Conference in San Francisco. She said she had the opportunity to meet Ms. Jocelyn and other Student Board Members from other cities.

Ms. Forrester said she attended the Head Start Policy Council meeting today, where they had elections for new officers. She said that Ms. Diana Ramirez, new Vice Chair Representative was elected by the name of Ms. Diana Ramirez. Ms. Forrester said it is great to see how parents look forward to stepping into a leadership position and doing the best job they can. Ms. Forrester asked that the County Board think about prenatal through adult life and how they might be able to support educators. She said that there is an article on discipline and special education that was a great read and that we all have to emphasize how we teacher kids about their emotions. She would like us to look spending more time supporting those in the classroom with professional development and social and emotional learning, especially during these stressful times. It is important that we are extra aware of stresses – joy and sadness and that we look at both when dealing with people.

Dr. Chan said she is looking forward to joining the Head Start team during the legislative visits in Washington DC next month.

Dr. Duardo provided the following highlights to the County Board:

### **Head Start and Early Learning**

- Yesterday, Head Start and Early Learning Division will be screening for all division staff the film *Black Boys*, a documentary that aims to illuminate the full humanity of Black boys and men in America.
- This film forms the foundation of the Office of Head Start's Community of Practice on Supporting the School Readiness and Success of Young African American Boys. LACOE is one of 12 programs selected from the Southwestern U.S. to participate.
- Thank you to our Head Start team for elevating this work and to Dr. Jamaal Williams and Dr. Tyisha Noise from LACOE's Equity, Diversity and Inclusion team who facilitated a discussion around the film.
- This weekend, LACHSA's musical theatre performed *Little Shop of Horrors* and it was incredible! Thank you so much to Principal Dr. Vartanian, our department chair Lois Hunter, and the director of the show, Chanel Castaneda.

### **DCHS Award**

- LACOE, along with LAUSD and Montebello USD were selected/approved by state CA Department of Health Care Services (DCHS) to be in the first cohort among 47 LEAs statewide (across 25 counties) to participate in the Children and Youth Behavioral Health Initiative (CYBHI) statewide multi-payer school-linked fee schedule, which will launch in January 2024.

**SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS RECALIBRATED SALARY PLAN CONSIDERATION**

Dr. Kanika White, Chief Human Resources Officer provided the report to the County Board.

At the requests by members of the Board to examine the County Superintendent of Schools salary schedule, staff conducted research and analysis. The process of collecting data included research on comparable agencies, Board meeting minutes' analysis, teleconferences and meetings with comparable agencies. Factors of consideration included size, population, budget oversight, signature programs, added statutory mandates, level of responsibility, exposure risk and base salary.

Identifying comparable agencies was challenging as LACOE is the only Class 1 county office, meaning it serves greater than 500,000 students, and is the largest regional educational agency with fiduciary oversight at ~\$25,000,000,000. All other county offices are considered Class 2 and below, serving fewer than 500,000 students. LACOE is the only agency with current responsibilities under AB 1840. As a region of its own, the County Superintendent of Schools is called to represent the region on all required local and state committees, rather than sharing responsibilities among county offices. When considering the number of districts, students, charter schools, budget, halls/camps, and signature programs, staff was unable to identify a single agency with responsibility and oversight even half that of LACOE. Given the vast differences in depth of responsibility and exposure to risk, the LACOE County Superintendent Salary is not equitable.

As of July 1, 2023, the current County Superintendent salary schedule is as follows:

The Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools Salary was set in May 2016 at \$267,788. On May 15, 2023, the current County Superintendent of Schools completed her seventh year of service to LACOE and reached the final step in the salary schedule in 2021. Although, COLA increases have been provided, they have been insufficient in maintaining equity and competitiveness in comparison to other large agencies. The salary schedule for the position of County Superintendent of Schools has failed to maintain competitiveness and grossly fails to align fairly and equitably considering the extraordinary responsibilities placed upon the position as the only Class 1 County Office.

The County Board inherently recognized the importance of placement. In 2020-2021, no LA County school district superintendent or Class 2 County office superintendent salary exceeded that of the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools' salary schedule. Although not compensated consistent with the level of responsibility given the vast size of the county, there appeared to be more close alignment with competitiveness at that time. The challenge of competitiveness in attracting and retaining talent is particularly important given the exodus of superintendents districts and county offices face. "Covid Stress and Violent Threats Driving Superintendents to Leave," Education Beat, EdSource (December 7, 2023).

Dr. Perez asked if there were any other changes that would be impacted (e.g. benefits, stipends, salary step). Dr. White responded that the County Board’s action will reflect changes only to the base salary schedule and no change in her step.

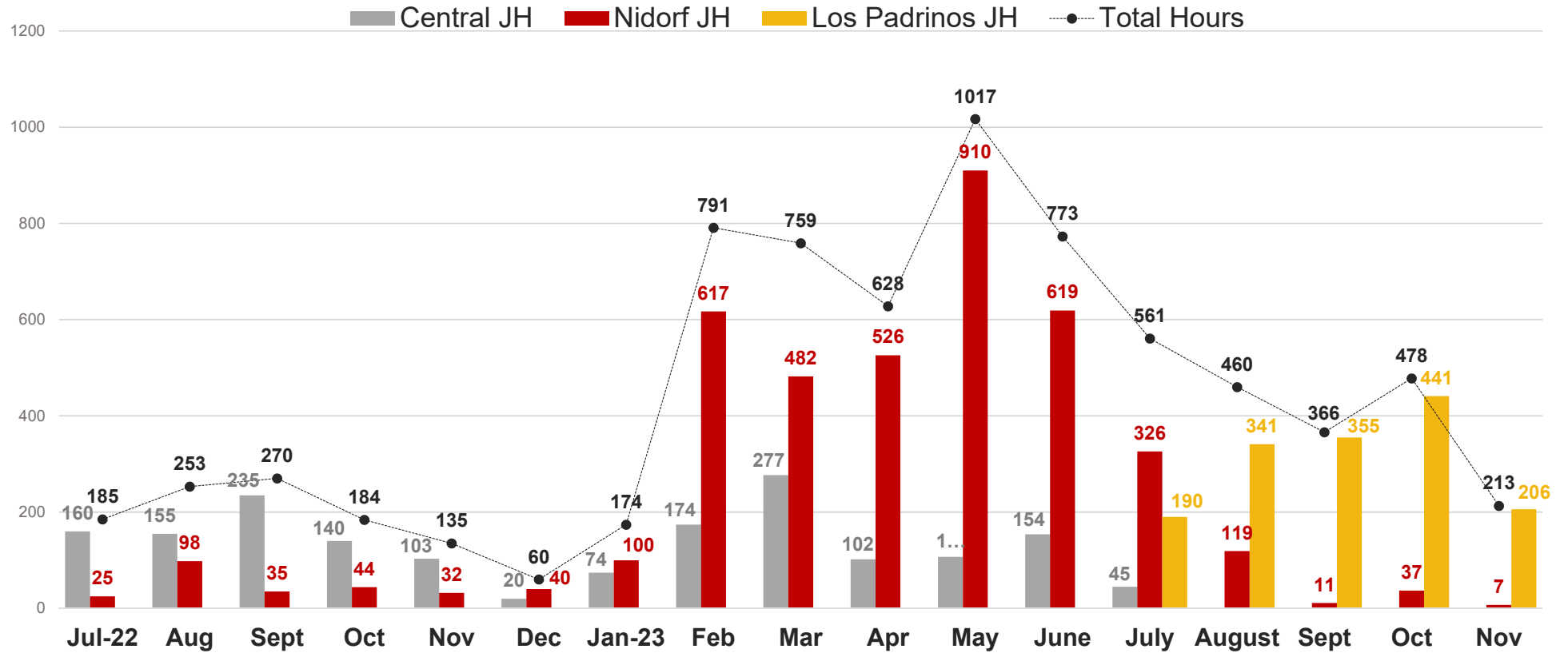

To this end, we have developed tools and trainings for educators to support the African American Learner, are leading efforts to implement Ethnic Studies across Los Angeles County, combat false narratives around Critical Race Theory and have committed to modeling organizational excellence in our own efforts to eliminate racism, mitigate the impacts of implicit bias on educational and life outcomes and foster belonging and connectedness within our organization and our broader educational community.

## BOARD RESOLUTION

NO. 23: 2023-24

### **Martin Luther King, Jr. Day** (January 15, 2024)

- WHEREAS,** the third Monday in January has been observed as a national holiday in commemoration of the birthday of civil rights icon Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; and
- WHEREAS,** Dr. King believed in a philosophy of nonviolence in advocating for social justice and equity for African Americans and other underrepresented groups; and
- WHEREAS,** he had a dream to one day live in a nation where people would not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character; and
- WHEREAS,** he led a movement that brought about desegregation, the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and a national awareness of racial injustice; and was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his work and was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Gold Medal; and
- WHEREAS,** in these challenging times when the nation continues to confront the challenges of discrimination and racism, it is especially important to celebrate Dr. King's life and legacy; and
- WHEREAS,** as Dr. King championed justice and equality, he recognized that educational inequality is one of the major obstacles to achieving these ideals; and LACOE is part of a movement to address this challenge; and
- WHEREAS,** this day has also been designated by Congress as a National Day of Service, a day held to pay tribute to the life and works of Dr. King who said that "*Everybody can be great because anybody can serve*" and that the National Day of Service helps to empower individuals, strengthen communities, bridge barriers and address social problems; and
- WHEREAS,** LACOE has a responsibility to promote good citizenship and civic responsibility for our students, and highlighting this day designed for community service and engagement is a great vehicle for this goal; and
- WHEREAS,** Ethnic Studies has been established as a graduation requirement for high school students across California, beginning with the graduating class of 2029-2030, African-American studies is essential in order to prepare young people to understand, recognize and value the history, culture, challenges, and contributions of African-Americans in American society, past and present

### **Fred Korematsu Day**

(January 30, 2024)

- WHEREAS**, the California Assembly and State Senate passed AB 1775 designating January 30 as Fred Korematsu Day of Civil Liberties and the Constitution and was signed into law in 2010; and
- WHEREAS**, this day commemorates the life and legacy of Korematsu, a courageous American who defied the Roosevelt administration’s internment policies during World War II; and
- WHEREAS**, Korematsu refused to comply with Civilian Exclusion Order 34, based on a federal executive order that imposed strict curfew regulations and required more than 120,000 Japanese Americans to leave their homes to be incarcerated in concentration camps; and
- WHEREAS**, Korematsu, who was arrested and convicted, fought back because he believed the conviction went against the basic freedoms guaranteed to him by the U.S. Constitution; and
- WHEREAS**, in his dissent, Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy argued that the internment “falls into the ugly abyss of racism”; and
- WHEREAS**, Korematsu’s conviction was ultimately overturned in 1983 a decision that influenced the US government’s passage of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988, recognizing that a grave injustice was done by forced relocation and incarceration of civilian Americans because of wartime prejudice; and
- WHEREAS**, Fred Korematsu received the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation’s highest civilian honor from President Bill Clinton in 1998; and
- WHEREAS**, the Fred T. Korematsu Institute was established to provide information, educational resources, exhibits and advocacy to communities and schools to honor the legacy of Fred Korematsu as a civil rights hero for all Americans; and
- WHEREAS**, as the nation continues to face issues of social injustice and racism, it is especially important to commemorate and reflect on the life and legacy of Fred Korematsu and the injustice committed against him and other Japanese Americans during WWII; and
- WHEREAS**, LACOE is committed to combat racism and strives to be a leader in equity, diversity and inclusion; and
- WHEREAS**, the History-Social Science Framework for California Public Schools, K-12, states that the history curriculum at each grade level relating to community, state, region, nation and the world must reflect and integrate the experiences of men and women of different racial, religious and ethnic groups; and

**WHEREAS,** Ethnic Studies has been established as a graduation requirement for high school students across California, beginning with the graduating class of 2029-2030, Asian American and Pacific Islander studies is essential in order to prepare young people to understand, recognize and value the history, culture, challenges and contributions of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in American society, past and present.

- WHEREAS,** Los Angeles County has been identified as one of the nation's high- intensity areas for human trafficking of youth, is one of the nation's most populous counties in the country and is also the site for large numbers of children and youth being victimized through commercial sexual exploitation and labor trafficking; and
- WHEREAS,** Children and youth represent a major population of trafficking victims in Los Angeles County that is estimated to be 30% of the total number or higher; and
- WHEREAS,** The Los Angeles County Office of Education is dedicated to supporting schools, districts and communities in Los Angeles County by providing training, technical assistance, best practices, legislative updates and resources to combat human trafficking; and
- WHEREAS,** National Human Trafficking Awareness Day will be recognized on January 11, 2024, and the month of January is recognized as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month,
- WHEREAS,** LACOE will continue to collaborate with key partners and experts in this work, including the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, Los Angeles County Human Trafficking Taskforce, Los Angeles County Probation Department, Department of Children and Family Services, University of Southern California, School of Social Work, Los Angeles County Sheriff's
