A meeting of the Los Angeles County Board of Education was held on Tuesday, May 19, 2026, at the Los Angeles County Office of Education Board Room.

PRELIMINARY ACTIVITIES

CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Cross called the meeting to order at 3:03 p.m.

Mr. Cross read the LACOE Land Acknowledgement.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Dr. Johnson led the Pledge of Allegiance.

(Dr. Cantú joined the meeting at 3:05pm)

ORDERING OF THE AGENDA

Dr. Perez indicated that there were no changes to the Board agenda.

It was **MOVED** by Dr. Johnson, **SECONDED** by Dr. Chan, and **CARRIED** to approve the Board agenda as presented.

- May 12, 2026 – *The minutes were approved as presented.*

It was **MOVED** by Dr. Chan, **SECONDED** by Dr. Johnson, and **CARRIED** to approve the May 12, 2026, minutes as presented.

COMMUNICATIONS: BOARD / DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT

Board members shared updates on recent educational events and initiatives across Los Angeles County.

- Dr. Chan gave an update from the Los Angeles County School Trustees Association (LACSTA) meeting where a new Board Member was elected. The meeting also focused on protecting Prop 98 for Public School Funding.
- Dr. Chan reported on a mini conference hosted by Association of California County Boards of Education (ACCBE) on May 15-16, 2026. 14 County Board representatives attended, and topics included Juvenile Halls, Community Schools, workforce development in light of AI, and its impact in rural and agricultural counties. She also learned about the needs of Native American students, as Los Angeles County has the highest number of Native American students in the state of California. The conference discussed Emergency Preparedness and acknowledged Superintendent Dr. Duardo and Jema Estrella as statewide leaders in developing an emergency preparedness plan for county districts and schools.
- Dr. Montaña reported on the California School Board Association (CSBA) Delegate Assembly on May 15-16, 2026, and called attention to topics that may impact the LACOE Board of Education. Prop 98 was a prominent discussion throughout the assembly as well as SOS for Student Achievement, which is a statewide plan by CSBA that calls for restructuring of the State Board of Education to be more accountable to local districts. She asked for future discussion on these topics among staff and the County Board.
- Ms. Breslauer and Dr. Johnson attended the Jewish American Heritage Luncheon hosted by LACOE staff where they discussed the importance of arts and education through the perspective of Jewish American Heritage. Ms. Breslauer encouraged the County Board to attend future events hosted by different heritage groups throughout LACOE.
- Dr. Perez offered condolences to Dr. Duardo who was absent due to a recent loss in her family and delivered communications on her behalf.
- Dr. Perez shared that Dr. Duardo participated on a panel for the California Contract Cities Conference with the Lynwood USD Superintendent, Lynwood City Manager and City Council member. They focused on meeting the moment through collaboration to better serve children and families in shared communities. Dr. Duardo highlighted LACOE's role in supporting school districts and strengthening partnerships between education, local government and community organizations.
- Dr. Perez highlighted LACOE's Engagement of the Heart Institute at the Sheraton Grand Los Angeles on May 8, 2026. This event was a joint effort between Quality Start Los Angeles and the Inclusive Early Education Expansion program, both housed in LACOE's Head Start and Early Learning Division. Nearly 300 educators and administrators from school districts as well as charter schools, nonprofit providers, and family childcare homes were in attendance. The institute focused on play as the foundation of lifelong learning and promoted access and belonging for young children with disabilities. Community partners,

including six of the seven LA County Regional Centers, Family Resource Centers and other vendors offered resources to support attendees.

- Dr. Perez reported on the Civic Showcase hosted by LACOE and the Orange County Office of Education at the Nixon Library on May 16, 2026. This event celebrated student achievement in civic engagement, where students presented projects focused on leadership, problem solving and community impact. Three schools were recognized as California Democracy Schools for embedding civic education into at least one grade level: Mountain View Elementary School (Claremont USD), Claremont High School (Claremont USD) and Las Flores Home Education Independent Study Academy (Bellflower USD)
- Dr. Perez discussed the fourth Annual PK-12 Educational Job Fair, hosted by LACOE and the Tulare County Office of Education at Ed Center West on May 16, 2026. Over 40 school districts and charter organizations from across Los Angeles County participated, representing communities from Antelope Valley to the South Bay. 679 job seekers were in attendance, making it the most successful event to date. This achievement reflects the leadership of Dr. White, Chief Human Resource Officer, and the entire Human Resource Services team. LACOE thanked all partners, staff and participants for supporting the future of education through educator recruitment across the county.
- Finally, Dr. Perez shared about the Universal Pre-K (UPK) – Career Development Initiative (CDI) year end reflections on May 16, 2026. Nearly 150 educators completed career pathways in early education and more than 70 Head Start parents and new educators earned permits to serve as Assistant Teachers. More than 70 others advanced through pathways for Teacher permits, TK certifications, and Family Development Credentials. LACOE also recognized 21 new educators from the inaugural Youth and Young Adult Pathway cohort. Since 2022, CDI has placed over 140 assistant teachers in classrooms across LA County and continues to expand career advancement opportunities, including a new BA Pathway launched in the spring. Key partners include Pacific Oaks College, West LA College, East LA College, the University of Connecticut, as well as school districts and nonprofit preschool providers for on-the-job training. The team will continue to seek funding to grow the initiative for educators, children and families across LA County.

Staff findings on the Renewal Petition for *California Creative Learning Academy Middle School, Grades 6-8*, Pursuant to Education Code Sections 47605, 47607 and 47607.2.

The *California Creative Learning Academy Middle School (CalCreative MS)* renewal petition was presented to the Los Angeles County Board of Education (County Board) pursuant to Education Code (EC) sections 47605, 47607, and 47607.2. The renewal process requires the authorizer to evaluate both the past performance of the charter school and whether the renewal petition meets the criteria for approval. CalCreative MS is currently authorized by the Los Angeles Unified School District Board of Education.

The lead petitioners for California Creative Learning Academy Middle School, responded to LACOE staff’s findings presentation.

Item VI. Consent Calendar Recommendations

A. Adoption of Board Resolution No. 71 to Recognize Juneteenth on June 19, 2026

The Superintendent recommends that the County Board adopt Resolution No. 71 as part of the regular County Board meeting on June 2, 2026; and further asks that the County Board declare June 19 as Juneteenth, aimed at ensuring African American employees experience equitable and inclusive treatment in the workplace while encouraging all education communities to observe this day with appropriate programs and activities.

We encourage school communities to focus on activities that generate in-depth discussions and an understanding of the history of emancipation and the extraordinary contributions of African Americans in advocating for social justice and racial equity. Through this resolution, LACOE commits to providing instructional resources and promising practices throughout the year to make a significant impact on the lives and futures of Black/African American students and to fostering an organizational culture rooted in justice, belonging and professional wellbeing.

Resolution No. 71 is attached.

Next Steps:

- The LACOE African American Heritage Committee will host a Juneteenth celebration to commemorate the Juneteenth holiday.
- The Equity and Social Justice Team will plan a schedule of events to uplift justice and honor the contributions of African Americans throughout the 2026-27 academic year.

BOARD RESOLUTION

No. 71: 2025-26

Juneteenth: Honoring Emancipation and Advancing Racial Justice for African American Employees and Students

WHEREAS, on June 19, 1865, news of emancipation reached Galveston, Texas, marking the end of chattel slavery in the United States—a day now recognized as Juneteenth, African American Freedom Day, or Emancipation Day; and

WHEREAS, while Juneteenth celebrates the end of a 400-year chapter of systemic repression, LACOE recognizes that the legacy of slavery persists through institutional and structural racism, which continues to adversely impact the educational, economic and social outcomes of African Americans; and

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles County Board of Education and the Superintendent declared racism a public health crisis in 2020, noting that silence and neutrality perpetuate injustice and that systemic inequities remain evident in early education and TK-12 academic results where African American students remain the lowest-performing group in the county; and

WHEREAS, the high-profile killings of Black individuals in recent years, including Sonya Massey, Sandra Bland, Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor and George Floyd provide traumatic evidence and a reminder of the persistence of identity-based violence, hate and discrimination that necessitates dedicated support for the psychological safety and wellbeing of our Black staff and students; and

WHEREAS, LACOE is uniquely positioned to lead for equity by systemically rejecting racist practices within our organization and schools and the local educational agencies we serve and support, moving beyond equity statements toward measurable, systemic change; and

WHEREAS, Juneteenth serves as a time to celebrate the extraordinary contributions of African Americans who have strengthened our nation despite centuries of inequality, while providing a framework for **Truth and Reconciliation** to address past and current harms.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Angeles County Board of Education and the Superintendent hereby declare June 19 as **Juneteenth** and mandate that it be observed with programs that generate in-depth discussion on the history of emancipation and the contributions of Black/African American individuals to social justice.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that LACOE will provide all early education and TK-12 educators in California with access to free, high-quality, asynchronous anti-bias education courses designed to cultivate a shared language around equity, identify implicit and explicit biases and provide practical tools for disrupting and mitigating systemic harm;

WHEREAS, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, through the June 4, 2024, Motion by Supervisor Holly J. Mitchell titled “Continuing the Work of Reparations in Los Angeles County,” has formally committed the County to identifying and stripping away the ‘structural and systemic barriers that continue to impede the lives of Black residents;’ and

WHEREAS, LACOE is committed to aligning with the Countywide mandate to address systemic barriers to equity and acknowledges that while there has been some progress made, employee feedback identify disparities in the experiences of African American employees related to racial bias, microaggressions and access to mentorship and advancement opportunities and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, in alignment with state and regional efforts, including Los Angeles County’s Strategic Initiatives to Promote Racial Equity in Los Angeles County, LACOE is committed to rectifying harms caused by structural racism that affect our African American community members. LACOE is committed to institutionalizing Cultural Proficiency and equity training and practices as well as workforce development and leadership pathways to ensure that African American staff are not excluded from the informal and formal networks of institutional power.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that LACOE will continue to champion the GENIUS (Genuine Empathy & Nurturing Intellect of Underserved Students) initiative to disrupt academic disparities and ensure that the assets, intellect and identities of African American students, including those in early learning and incarcerated settings, are celebrated, nurtured and protected.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Superintendent and Board will not tolerate racism or colorism within LACOE offices and schools, and will provide the necessary resources, structures and healing practices, such as restorative workshops and transformative dialogue, to ensure healthy, identity-affirming and just learning and working environments for all.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING

The County Board is committed to supporting the safety and well-being of LACOE students and desires to facilitate the prevention of and response to child abuse and neglect. The County Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies for preventing, recognizing, and promptly reporting known or suspected child abuse and neglect.

The County Board recognizes the unique and vital role that schools play in partnering with families to strengthen protective factors and connect families with essential services and supports when additional help is needed.

The County Superintendent or designee may provide a student who is a victim of abuse with school-based mental health services or other support services and/or may refer the student to resources available within the community as needed.

Child Abuse Prevention

The County Board recognizes LACOE's responsibility to educate students about the dangers of child abuse so that they will acquire the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and to react appropriately and promptly.

LACOE's instructional program may provide age-appropriate and culturally sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum which explains students' right to live free of abuse, includes instruction in the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and react appropriately and promptly, informs them of available support resources, and teaches them how to obtain help and disclose incidents of abuse. The curriculum shall also include training in self-protection techniques.

The County Board further recognizes LACOE's role as a model and leader in education through the provision and promotion of enhanced training and decision support processes for mandated reporters in education, in alignment with recent legislative changes in the definition of reportable general neglect. The County Board further recognizes the critical partnership between schools and families and the vital role of schools in strengthening community support pathways to address unmet needs and mitigate risk, as appropriate.

The LACOE's program also may include age-appropriate ~~curriculum~~ instruction in sexual abuse and sexual assault awareness and prevention. Upon written request of a student's parent/guardian, the student shall be excused from taking such instruction. (Education Code 51900.6)

The County Superintendent or designee may display posters, in areas on campus where students frequently congregate, notifying students of the appropriate telephone number to call to report child abuse or neglect. (Education Code 33133.5)

In addition, student identification cards for students in grades 7-12 shall include the National Domestic Violence Hotline telephone number. (Education Code 215.5)

The County Superintendent or designee shall, to the extent feasible, seek to incorporate community resources into child abuse prevention programs and may use these resources to provide parents/guardians with instruction in parenting skills and child abuse prevention.

Child Abuse Reporting

The County Board recognizes that child abuse has severe consequences and that LACOE has a responsibility to protect students by facilitating the prompt reporting of known and suspected incidents of child abuse. The County Superintendent or designee will establish procedures for the identification and reporting of such incidents in accordance with law.

Procedures for reporting child abuse, as specified in Penal Code 11164-11174.3, shall be included in the LACOE and/or school comprehensive safety plan. (Education Code 32282)

Employees, board members, contractors, and volunteers who are mandated reporters, as defined by law and administrative regulation, are obligated to report all known or suspected incidents of child abuse and neglect. Mandated reporters shall cooperate with agencies responsible for investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse and neglect. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Before beginning employment or commencing services, any person who will be a mandated reporter by virtue of his/her position shall sign a statement indicating that he/she has knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and will comply with those provisions. The signed statement shall be retained by the County Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

LACOE employees who fail to report such abuse or neglect may be subject to criminal or civil penalties as well as disciplinary action by LACOE. LACOE employees who unlawfully disclose information from abuse/neglect reports may be subject to fines and/or imprisonment.

Mandated Reporter Training Expectations

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide training regarding the reporting duties of mandated reporters, as required by law and as specified in the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

Employees, board members, contractors, and volunteers who are mandated reporters shall receive training that enables them to understand their legal duties, criteria for reporting, and the potential impacts of reporting on children and families. Training shall be aligned with statutory requirements and best practices recommended by the California Mandated Reporting Advisory Committee and the Child Welfare Council's Mandated Reporting to Community Supporting Taskforce.

In the event that training is not provided to mandated reporters, the County Superintendent or designee shall report to the California Department of Education the reasons that such training is not provided. (Penal Code 11165.7)

~~LACOE employees who fail to report such abuse or neglect may be subject to criminal or civil penalties as well as disciplinary action by LACOE. LACOE employees who unlawfully disclose information from abuse/neglect reports may be subject to fines and/or imprisonment.~~

Incidents Reporting at Head Start Delegate Agencies and Child Care Partners

All Head Start and Early Head Start delegate agencies shall protect and safeguard the immediate health, safety, and personal rights of its students as defined by the Department of Social Services, Community Care Licensing (CCL). Delegate agencies must make immediate reports to LACOE of any suspected acts of child abuse or any unusual incidents that threaten the safety of the children, especially if delegate agency staff is involved. Delegate agencies shall adopt a policy consistent with this policy for reporting suspected abuse or unusual incidents.

Any such acts committed by employees of Head Start and Early Head Start delegate agencies that violate the Health and Safety Code and the Head Start Performance Standards, whether due to carelessness or intentional disregard of the health, safety, and personal rights of its students, shall not be tolerated by the delegate agency. Violations of this policy shall subject the delegate agency to restrictions and penalties including, but not limited to, suspensions and termination of the agency's contract with LACOE.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING

Purpose

This administrative regulation establishes procedures for the prevention, identification, and reporting of child abuse and neglect.

This regulation further establishes mandated reporter training requirements, including compliance with Assembly Bill 2085.

Definitions

Child abuse or neglect includes the following: (Penal Code 11165.2, 11165.5, 11165.6)

1. A physical injury or death inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person
2. Sexual abuse of a child, including sexual assault or sexual exploitation, as defined in Penal Code 11165.1
3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2 Specifically, Penal Code 11165.2 defines general neglect to mean “negligent failure of a person having the care or custody of a child to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, medical care, or supervision where no physical injury to the child has occurred but the child is at substantial risk of suffering serious physical harm or illness. ‘General neglect’ does not include a parent’s economic disadvantage.”
4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3
5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)
2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of employment (Penal Code 11165.5, 11165.6)

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, vice principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be legally privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)
4. An injury caused by ~~a school~~ an employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, for purposes of self-defense, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of the student (Education Code 49001)

5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by the student (Education Code 49001)
6. Homelessness or classification as an unaccompanied minor (Penal Code 11165.15)

7. A child receiving treatment by spiritual means pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 16509.1, or not receiving specified medical treatment for religious reasons

Additionally, general neglect does not include: (Penal Code 11165.2)

1. A parent/guardian's economic disadvantage

Assembly Bill 2085 (2022), effective January 1, 2023, revised the definition of general neglect by narrowing it to circumstances in which a child is at substantial risk of suffering serious physical harm or illness and clarifying that general neglect does not include a parent or guardian's economic disadvantage.

The Board recognizes that effective, legally accurate, and equity-centered mandated reporter training is essential to protecting children from harm while avoiding unnecessary and harmful system involvement for families.

General neglect shall be understood consistent with AB 2085 as circumstances in which a child is at substantial risk of suffering serious physical harm or illness and does not include a parent or guardian's economic disadvantage.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, ~~teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; administrators and directors; licensees, administrators, and employees of a licensed day care facility; Head Start program teachers; LACOE security officers; licensed nurses or health care providers; and administrators, presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program~~ employees; volunteers who are over 18 years of age and who interact with pupils outside of the immediate supervision and control of the pupil's parent or guardian or a school employee; board members; and contractors whose duties require contact with or supervision of pupils. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on the person's training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. However, *reasonable suspicion* does not require certainty that child abuse or neglect has occurred nor does it require a specific medical indication of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Reportable Offenses

~~A~~ Using the procedures provided below, a mandated reporter shall make a report using the procedures provided below whenever; the mandated reporter, while acting in a professional capacity or within the scope of employment, he/she the mandated reporter has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11165.9, 11166.05, 11167)

Any LACOE employee who reasonably believes to have observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury against a victim who is a child ~~under age 14~~ years of age shall notify a peace officer. (Penal Code 152.3, 288)

The fact that a child is experiencing homelessness or is classified as an unaccompanied minor, as defined in the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 USC 11434a), is not, in and of itself, a sufficient basis for reporting child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11165.15)

General neglect shall be understood consistent with AB 2085 as circumstances in which a child is at substantial risk of suffering serious physical harm or illness and does not include a parent or guardian's economic disadvantage. (Penal Code 11165.2)

Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, the report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement and a single report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. Any member who has knowledge that the member designated to report has failed to do so shall thereafter make the report. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom the person knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Reporting Procedures

1. Initial Telephone Report

Immediately or as soon as practicable after knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a school district police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11165.9, 11166)

Mandated reporters suspecting child abuse or neglect shall file a report with one of the following child protective agencies:

Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) at (800) 540-4000 (24 hours/7 days per week).

Local law enforcement (e.g., city police department or sheriff's department), depending on the local law enforcement agency with jurisdiction over the location where the suspected child abuse occurred.

Early education centers and State preschools must also report incidents to the DSS Community Care Licensing Office at (310) 337-4335 (Culver City) or (323) 981-3350 (Monterey Park).

The following are not child protective agencies and are not authorized to receive such reports: (1) school district police and school security officers; (2) site administrator; and (3) school medical professionals (e.g., school nurses and doctors).

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall prepare and either send, fax, or electronically transmit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed California Department of Justice (DOJ) form (BCIA 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

The DOJ form may be obtained from the central office or other appropriate agencies, such as the police department, sheriff's department, or county probation or welfare department.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

- a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter
- b. The child's name and address, present location, and, where applicable, school, grade, and class
- c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians
- d. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person(s) who might have abused or neglected the child
- e. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to the mandated reporter. (Penal Code 11167)

The mandated reporter may give to an investigator from an agency investigating the case, including a licensing agency, any information relevant to an incident of child abuse or neglect or to a report made for serious emotional damage pursuant to Penal Code 11166.05. (Penal Code 11167)

3. Internal Reporting

The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose the mandated reporter's identity to a supervisor, the principal, or the County Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166)

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

However, employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are encouraged, but not required, to notify the principal or supervisor as soon as possible after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency. When so notified, the principal shall inform the County Superintendent or designee.

The principal so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal or supervisor may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Training

~~Within the first six weeks of each school year, or within the first six weeks of employment if hired during the school year, the~~ The County Superintendent or designee shall provide at least annual training on mandated reporting requirements to LACOE employees, volunteers, and persons working on ~~their~~ LACOE's behalf who are mandated reporters. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

~~In addition, at least once every three years, the~~ County Superintendent or designee shall provide annual training on the prevention of abuse, including sexual abuse and assault, of children on school grounds, by school personnel and volunteers, and in school-sponsored programs, to school personnel employees, volunteers, and persons working on LACOE's behalf who are mandated reporters may receive training in the prevention of child abuse, including sexual abuse on school grounds, by school personnel, or in school-sponsored programs. (Education Code 44691)

Training shall include but shall not be limited to:

- Legal duties and reporting thresholds, including reasonable suspicion
- Definitions of abuse and neglect, including AB 2085 revisions and use of structured decision-making tools, as available/appropriate
- Clarification that poverty alone does not constitute neglect
- Bias awareness, disproportionality, and system impacts

- Considerations for specific student populations
- Appropriate consultation and supportive pathways, when permitted by law

The aforementioned training shall be provided to school personnel hired during the course of the school year and to volunteers upon commencing volunteer services.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

The County Superintendent or designee will develop a process for all persons required to receive training to provide proof of completing the training within the first six weeks of each school year, within the first six weeks of that person's employment, or within six weeks of commencing volunteer services. The County Superintendent or designee will conduct periodic review to ensure compliance with legal requirements and alignment with best practices.

The County Superintendent or designee shall use training ~~comparable~~ equivalent to the online training module provided by the California Department of Social Services that is developed specifically to meet the requirements of Education Code 44691. The alternative training module shall be approved by the public entity risk pool joint powers authority or liability insurance provider used by LACOE. The County Superintendent or designee shall report to the State Department of Education the alternative training module being used ~~in its place~~. (Education Code 44691)

Training shall also include guidance in the appropriate discipline of students, physical contact with students, and maintenance of ethical relationships with students to avoid actions that may be misinterpreted as child abuse.

The training shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, training in identification and reporting of child abuse and neglect. In addition, the training shall include information that failure to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect as required by law is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment and/or a fine as specified. (Education Code 44691; Penal Code 11165.7)

The County Superintendent or designee shall obtain and retain proof of each mandated reporter's completion of the training. (Education Code 44691)

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

Victim Interviews by Social Services

Whenever a representative from CDSS or another government agency investigating suspected child abuse or neglect deems it necessary, a suspected victim may be interviewed during school hours, on school premises, concerning a report of suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility. The child shall be given the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult school employee or volunteer aide selected by the child. (Penal Code 11174.3)

A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the principal or designee shall inform the person of the following requirements prior to the interview: (Penal Code 11174.3)

1. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable the child to be as comfortable as possible.
2. The selected person shall not participate in the interview.
3. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child.
4. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5.

If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the County Superintendent or designee and/or principal will not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. It is the responsibility of the peace officer or agent to notify the parent/guardian of the situation. (Education Code 48906)

The principal or designee must complete a "Removal of Students from School During School House by Peace Officer" form (LACOE form). The principal or designee shall file and distribute the form as designated.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION AND REPORTING (continued)

Parent/Guardian Complaints

Upon request, the County Superintendent or designee will provide parents/guardians with a copy of this administrative regulation which contains procedures for reporting suspected child abuse occurring ~~at a school site~~ on LACOE property to appropriate agencies. For parents/guardians whose primary language is not English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those guidelines and/or procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a LACOE employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect ~~at a school site~~ on LACOE property, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee shall also file a report when obligated to do so pursuant to Penal Code 11166 using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR_3200-3205.

Notifications

The County Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. Additionally, LACOE also shall provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, any person who will be a mandated reporter by virtue of the person's ~~his/her~~ position shall sign a statement indicating knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and compliance with such provisions. The signed statement shall be retained by the County Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The County Superintendent or designee also will notify all employees that:

1. A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of the mandated reporter's professional capacity or outside the scope of employment. (Penal Code 11172)

_____ Any other person making a report shall not incur civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that the person knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)

2. If a mandated reporter fails to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, the mandated reporter may be guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 11166)

3. _____ No employee shall be subject to any sanction by LACOE for making a report unless it can be shown that the employee ~~he/she~~ knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11166, 11172).
