SEL Implementation Assessment

Your team will need to designate a time to complete the SEL School Implementation Assessment together. This process should take approximately 60-90 minutes.

This process helps schools evaluate SEL in their systems so that they can coordinate and build upon SEL practices and programs to create environments that infuse SEL into every part of students' educational experiences.

The assessment rubric that you will be completing is an essential first step in the process of schoolwide SEL integration.

- WHY complete the assessment? The rubric can help teams determine where the school is in terms of implementation and identify next steps.
- **WHAT is the result?** Completing the rubric will help highlight areas of strength and opportunities for growth. These insights will help schools create a customized implementation plan for schoolwide SEL. For a brief overview of the concepts that will be discussed **click here.**
- **HOW does it work?** At the beginning of the scoring process, each person on the team should complete the rubric individually. The team will then assign a group score to each item using a consensus-building process that encourages equity of voice.
